A Providential Push

Act 1: The Provinces are Petrified! (Esther 4:1-3)

Scene 1: Mordecai Mourns... Esther 4:1-2

- Mordecai mourned in the midst of the city (v. 1).
 - ♦ He tore his clothes
 - ♦ He put on sackcloth and ashes
 - ◆ He went <u>public</u>.
 - ◆ He <u>cried</u> out loudly and bitterly.

All of these aspects of Mordecai's mourning were <u>outward</u> expressions of inward feelings.

- Mordecai mourned at the entrance of the King's gate. (v. 2)
 - ◆ No one was allowed to enter the king's gate while mourning.
 - ◆ Mordecai still went to (but not through) the King's gate. Why?
 - He wanted to get Esther's attention!

Scene 2: The Kingdom Mourns Esther 4:3

• Mordecai was an example that all of the Jews chose to follow!



- The Jews' response was great—Jews from every province mourned.
- The Jews' <u>reaction</u> was great—They mourned greatly, with fasting, weeping, lamenting, sackcloth, and ashes.

Act 2: A Confrontational Conversation (Esther 4:4-17)

Scene 1: Esther reaches out to Mordecai Esther 4:4

- Esther and her helpers were likely <u>isolated</u> from general world affairs.
- Esther was deeply distressed by Mordecai's mourning, because she didn't know why.

Scene 2: Mordecai informs Esther Esther 4:5-8a

- When Mordecai refused to <u>communicate</u> with Esther on her terms, she did it his way.
- Esther and Mordecai communicated through Hathach.
 - ✦ He was an assigned servant.
 - ♦ He was a trustworthy servant.
- Mordecai sent the edict back with Hathach in order to...
 - ◆ Show it to Esther.
 - ◆ Explain it to Esther
 - ◆ To command Esther!



Scene 3: Mordecai and Esther debate Esther 4:8b-14

- Mordecai's Command: Go to the King!
 - ♦ Beg for his <u>favor</u>.
 - ◆ <u>Advocate</u> for her people.
- Esther's Timid Response
 - ◆ Persian Law- There was a possible penalty of death.
 - ◆ Present Circumstance- Xerxes hadn't called to her for 30 days.
- Mordecai's Threat
 - ◆ He threatened her for false <u>security</u>.
 - ◆ He threatened her for fearful silence.
- Mordecai's Sovereign Reminder- "For such a time as this" (v. 14).

Esther's election to her Queenly position was for <u>service</u> to God, not for her own benefit.

Scene 4: Esther requests fasting and prayer Esther 4:15-17

- Esther's instructions:
 - **♦**Gather the Jews
 - **♦**Fast and pray
- Esther's risk- "If I perish, I perish."
 - Esther is now showing courage like <u>Vashti</u> and <u>Mordecai</u>.
 - When Esther accepted that she was providentially positioned, she lived out her <u>purpose</u>.



God's Sovereignty in the Shadows

- Trustworthy Hathach
- The word "favor"
- Mordecai's words: "For such a time as this."

Practical Applications

- Have some iron-sharpening iron friends who tell you what you need to hear (Prov. 27:17)
- Lessons of Bravery:
 - ◆Don't crumble under circumstances—trust God!
 - **◆**Don't compromise convictions—<u>obey</u> God!
- You need to have a providential perspective of your life!
 - ◆ Providentially confront your <u>discontent</u>.
 - ◆ Providentially evaluate your opportunities.
 - ◆ Providentially embrace your challenges.
 - ◆ Providentially trust God in trials.
