Paul & Titus' Relationship

- Paul likely led Titus to Christ and discipled him personally (Titus 1:4).
- Paul gave Titus a series of missions:
 - 1. The Jerusalem Council (Acts 15; Gal. 2:1-5).
 - 2. The church in Corinth.
 - 3. The church in Corinth again.
 - 4. The churches in Crete
 - 5. Paul's 2nd Imprisonment
 - 6. The church/churches in Dalmatia

Titus' Traits

- Titus was trustworthy.
- Titus was effective.
- Titus was gifted.
- Titus was energetic.
- Titus was driven.
- Titus was relational.
- Titus was grounded.
- Titus was pastoral.
- Titus was brave.
- Titus was committed.

Purpose of this Letter

- To remind Titus of his mission in Crete.
 - o Set up <u>leadership</u> in every church (Titus 1:5-9).
 - o Warn about false teachers living horrible lives (Titus 1:10-16).
 - o Ground the Cretan churches in <u>sound</u> doctrine (Titus 2:1).



- o Provide strong leadership to the church planting movement in Crete (Titus 2:15).
- To affirm Titus' delegated <u>authority</u> (Titus 1:1-5; 2:15).
- To encourage Titus to push forward amidst opposition (Titus 2:15).
- To provide Titus with important <u>reminders</u> (3:1-11).
- To communicate travel plans for Artemas, Tychichus, Zenas, and Appollos (Titus 2:12-14).

Themes of the Book

- Churches need qualified leadership.
- Christians need sound <u>doctrine</u> and distinct <u>living</u>, and those two should never be separated.
- God's grace is central to your Christian walk.
- Live a Christ-like, Spirit-filled life of good deeds, not questionable practices and useless arguments.
